Let us show you the way...





The essentials

Nef du Grand Palais

THE + MAJESTIC

Inaugurated in 1900 for the World's Fair, the Grand Palais is one of Paris' unique monuments. Registered as a listed monument, it houses three distinct areas on 86000 square yards: the Nef (nave), the National Galleries, and the Palais de la Découverte. Concerts, haute-couture fashion show, carnivals, electro nights, contemporary art exhibitions... the 15000 square-yard nave has become a vast place of excesses very popular among Parisians for its huge cultural events. The strength of this museum lies in its programming, being broad, eclectic, and for all ages, thus giving way to many surprises.

The quai Branly museum offers to visitors travel through arts and civilisations from Africa, Asia, Oceania, and the Americas. Opened in 2006, the building designed by the architect Jean Nouvel houses collections from the national museum of African and Oceanian Arts, as well as those from the ethnology research department of the Human Sciences museum (*Musée de l'Homme*). In all, it holds more than 300 000 objects.

Besides the permanent collections, a dozen temporary exhibitions are displayed every year, for instance on the century of jazz or the myth of Tarzan. An important place is given to theatre, dance, music, and contemporary arts, particularly reflected by the works of eight native Australian artists exhibited on the ceilings and the facade of the building on *rue de l'Université*.

From Benoît Poelvoorde and Sébastien Chabal, to Mika, Monica Bellucci or Franck Dubosc, this Parisian institution, opened in 1882, welcomes 800 000 visitors each year and displays about 250 celebrities in waxworks.

For over six months, every little detail -beauty spots, undereye circles, birthmarks or scars- is reproduced by the sculptors. Everything is minutely studied: the color of the eyes, of the skin, of teeth, of hair... Every single hair is implanted one by one, and there are as many as 500 000 of them on a single head!

Musée Grévin



Made to bite right into, the Choco-Story is a 700 square-yard museum created by the Belgian Van Belle family. For a one or two-hour visit, you learn everything about the history of cocoa, you understand the different processing methods, and take part in demonstrations and tastings of products manufactured on the premises by chocolate makers.

French people, crazy about this sweet, eat a bit more than six kilos of chocolate per year and per person!

Conceived by French president Georges Pompidou this museum had to be set in the center of Paris, and become a cultural centre of a new sort, dedicated to various forms of contemporary creation. The gamble paid off! Since its opening in 1977, it has welcomed more than 150 millions of visitors, and displayed works of art by renowned artists such as Calder, Dubuffet, Giacometti, Munch, Kandinsky, Miró, Soulages, Wahrol and many more.

A short time ago, an area specially dedicated to teenagers was created. This place makes them discover art through new themes such as the street, clothes, or mangas. Also not to be missed: the beautiful view of Paris from the sixth floor of the building.

Musée Dupuytren

THE + FRIGHTENING

Created in 1835 thanks to Professor Guillaume Dupuytren, the museum brings together 6000 items: skeletons, wax casts, and other organs. Here you can find the body of Pipine, affected by phocomelia (when hands and feet are directly attached to the body trunk) as well as two-headed foetus. Not for the faint-hearted...

Musée des Arts forains

THE + ENCHANTING

Located in the former wine warehouses of Bercy, the museum transports visitors in the atmosphere of 19th century funfairs. Museum does not rhyme with boring! Children and adults, who have remained kids at heart, can touch the objects and have a ride on the merry-go-round. Old bicycles, wooden horses, rifle ranges, and tombolas from the golden age of carnivals are gathered there. This museum indeed holds one of the largest collections of objects from fairgrounds in Europe. Three square miles dedicated to dreams and magic...

AMALIRY GALLON CREATOR OF VERTICAL GARDENS

What is a vertical garden?

A climbing garden is made of plants -about 30 of them in one square meter- inserted into a metal frame and fed thanks to an irrigation system. City dwellers feel less stressed when they are close to nature. Beside its aesthetic soothing effects, it helps insulate the building on the outside and improves air quality in the inside.

Why are people so infatuated with those vertical gardens?

People are more and more aware of ecology and environmentalism. Vertical gardens have become accessible and

> common.They grew in numbers in the city and are now part of the urban landscape. There are about 150 of them in Paris.



It is quite frequent for us to create vertical gardens for individuals. For low budgets, we do create two meters square vertical plant structures on wheels



Amaury Gallon's personal favourites Place Stravinsky "Niki de Saint Phalle's colourful sculptures are magnificent." The Stravinsky fountain, also called the automatons' fountain (fontaine des Automates), on the side of the Centre Georges Pompidou, is the combined work of the lovers lean Tinguely and Niki de Saint Phalle. Created in 1983, the fountain displays 16 sculptures. The metal ones are Jean Tinguely's, and the colourful ones Niki de Saint Phalle's. This masterpiece which evokes Igor Stravinsky's musical compositions is in perpetual motion, with its mechanical sculptures animated by water jets.


The square is located right in front of the Saint-Eustache church. Designed by the architect Arretche in a very contemporary spirit, the foundation slabs are in the shape of a maze. At its centre, a striking statue named Écoute ("listen up") depicts a man's face lying down and resting on a hand. Created in 1986 by the sculptor Henri de Muller, it is made of Burgundy sandstone and weights 70 tons.

The artist also created the sundial a bit farther in the garden of Les Halles.

And you, which kind of Parisian are you?

Unpleasant, complainers, never satisfied, and always stressed, Parisians don't really have a good reputation. And yet, despite their apparent indifference, they can be nice and even charming when approached! Paris is also said not to be very accessible when you don't know it. As a result: Paris and its inhabitants need to be tamed. With its very different neighbourhoods -popular, hype, or bourgeois- its population is very heterogeneous. Whether they be underground, geeks, traditional, bobo, parents, or adventurous, Parisians have their favourite neighbourhoods and addresses.

Le Réservoir

THEIR FAVOURITE PLACE

Bar, restaurant, auditorium, and nightclub at the same time, N Le Réservoir is an atypical place, as much for its look as for its D programming. One can be surprised by the crazy decoration E with its mirrors and its baroque-styled wrought iron arbour, its R armchairs and sofas from various times, and by its very eclectic G concerts: jazz, samba, rock, pop, soul, funk, disco...
